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Teaching and Knowledge: Companionship

1. In this novel, **companionship** and **friendships** are a rarity. So far, the boss, Curley and Slim have outwardly questioned George and Lennie's relationship because it's seen as abnormal for a man to care about the well-being of another man. Remember, this is during the time of the **Great depression** where it was a dog-eat-dog world, where a man had to take care of himself, and that was all.
2. Because of this unique contextual setting, even Candy's relationship with his dog is frowned upon. In chapter 3 we see Carlson, a ranch hand, bully his way into killing Candy's dog with a pistol in the back of the head. Carlson takes away Candy's only **companion**. Why? Because he doesn't understand the **value of this relationship**. Why? Possibly because the society they all live in has destroyed the importance of long-term friendships and relationships.
3. America's Great Depression created 'mean' people whose primary concern was themselves (or their family, if they had one). **Marginalised** men and women were affected most because they were often **discriminated** the most. The playing field was no longer equal and **prejudice** and **discrimination** simply increased making this society a very difficult one to live in.

He **rippled** the edge of the deck **nervously**, and the **little snapping** noise drew the eyes of all the men in the room, so that he stopped doing it. The **silence** fell on the room again. 4. **A minute passed, and another minute.** Candy lay still, staring at the ceiling. Slim gazed at him for a moment and then looked down at his hands; he subdued one hand with the other, and held it down. There

came a **little gnawing** sound from under the floor and all the men looked down toward it **gratefully**. Only Candy continued to stare at the ceiling.
